# The Duke Building

Tany locals have countless fond memories of working and patronizing Duke's from those wanting to play a game of cards, to those, like Virginia Tippett, whose first job was as a waitress in high school making \$0.50 per hour. Tips were usually a nickel or dime, and she remembered which patrons tipped the best. Virginia saved all of her tips one summer and ended up with almost

\$150. In 1969, that was a lot of money. Every Friday night was Dance Night at Duke's featuring the Karl Berrymann Orchestra with Paul J. Bailey.

Another treasured recent memory came about in 1999. Loic and Karleen Jaffres were driving through Leonardtown and discovered the Duke Building and fell in love with the Town. They opened their renowned French restaurant, Café des Artistes in the building a few months later and did an amazing business until 2016.

One particular resident has many great memories about

the building; as Ellen Duke Wilson grew up playing and working there and is now the proud owner of the historic building. She fondly remembers the cover of the menus simply stating "Dukes" with a small inscription at the bottom saying, "Where Friends Meet since 1928". She remembers a heated debate ensuing as George Clark exclaimed, "The price of a cup of coffee jumped to 25 cents, No Ginny!" after a 10-cent increase was posted on the menus.

Ellen Duke Wilson mused, "My children, John and Paul, also grew up in the building enjoying contests timed by Grandma Duke using a neon Greyhound Co. Clock and being rewarded with a warm cinnamon bun! I can still see the half whiskey barrels brimming with red geraniums out front with American and Maryland flags in them beside the front doors." So many celebrations by generations of families have been held in this building, said Duke Wilson. "I think Leonardtown has always been a Happening Place! I recall in 1976 for the bicentennial celebration we were all in floor length colonial costumes (created by Councilman Bobby Wathen's daughter, Leslie Roberts, former Councilwoman) with flags flying, cooking burgers in an open-air stand with picnic tables on the sidewalks, just like the outdoor seating of today's downtown." cont. on page 6

Today that culture continues to rule Duke's Corner. "Sean Coogan has delivered the Duke Building from a gem to a diamond. The community spirit continues to shine with crowds of people enjoying the beautiful new restaurant. What's old is new with the same good brew! And the mixologist in the bar can make cocktails as spectacular as Dickie Dukes Pina Coladas!" exclaims Ellen Duke.

Today, still an anchor for the Town, the building is now the home of Social Coffeehouse and Social Coffee Roasters, a thriving gathering place for all. Sean Coogan opened the original Social Coffee house just down Fenwick Street in 2019. The business quickly became a favorite hangout for all ages. Sean saw the success Social was having and the positive direction the Town was going in and felt the time was right to expand his business. For many

people that walked into the empty Duke building the task was too much to take on. But when Sean walked in, he saw potential- an iconic building, steeped in history, located on a major corner in a thriving town. The supportive atmosphere of the Town officials and staff gave him comfort in mitigating some of the risk involved in rehabbing a building of this size and age. Sean worked day and many nights from October 2022 until the grand opening in April 2024 restoring the building. He did much of the work himself and had close oversight of the remaining work, making sure everything was done right. "I find it very rewarding when people walk in and say how fantastic the building looks today!", asserts Sean.

Today Social Coffeehouse and Social Coffee Roasters stands on the corner of Washington and Fenwick Streets with new signage that harkens to the original signage of days gone by. "The business is now open seven days a week, opening at 6 am and some nights are open until 2 am! Social employs 45 staff, up from 8 in the original location. The coffee roasting on sight is something no one else is doing on this scale. The beans come from all over the world; Indonesia, Columbia, Guatemala, Ethiopia, etc. Social is now a major anchor business in a town that is seeing a resurgence," says Coogan.

The business brings in 300 to 600 people daily and combined with the other bustling businesses in town and the efforts put forth by the Town leadership, the business owners and its residents, Leonardtown is happening and is where people want to be.

LEONARDTOWN CELEBRATES THE FIRST **YEAR OF MAIN STREET DESIGNATION** – In September of 2023, Leonardtown was awarded the 'Main Street' community designation by the Governor's office. This title comes with an acknowledgment of historic preservation efforts locally, as well as a focus on economic revitalization. While the downtown area has been bustling for some time now, it has not always been this way. Mayor Dan Burris remembers the days of driving through Town and seeing boarded-up buildings and no activity. Now, with commercial space leasing as soon as it goes on the market, and incredible event programming like the Summer Concert Series and Movie Fest, the days of Leonardtown being sleepy are in the past! The Leonardtown Main Street Advisory Council made up of community stakeholders like residents, business and property owners, realtors, and other professionals, is tasked with guiding the program here in Town. The State office calls the system at work through Main Street "The Approach," which consists of four pillars: Economic Vitality, Organization, Promotions, Design, and the Maryland exclusive pillar of Clean, Safe, and Green. Meeting monthly, their agenda varies from discussion about the successful Façade Improvement Grant program to exciting new initiatives and planning value-add experiences for our economic ecosystem. Lt. Gov. Aruna Miller, DHCD Secretary Jake Day, and other members of the Governor's Cabinet visited Leonardtown to do an official Main Street ribbon cutting in February 2024. They shared excitement for what is to come with our local program, and we are just as excited to be a part of the incredible work to follow!

She continued to enhance her career by Opening and Managing the Hampton Inn by Hilton, Fairfield Inn, and TownePlace Suites by Marriott. Jennifer is devoted to our community through tourism, economic development, and many charitable agencies. She will be the Heart of Main Street Leonardtown.

Additional Cable and Internet Options – For many years there has only been one local franchise option for cable TV services throughout Leonardtown and all of St. Mary's County. In 2024, Comcast and Think Big have moved into the market and are putting in the infrastructure to be able to offer competitive choices to residents of St. Mary's County. The choice of which, if any of the companies that you choose to utilize, is completely up to you.

Leonardtown Utility Improvements – The Leonardtown wastewater treatment plant has been under construction since January 2023. The expansion will increase the treatment capacity from 680,000 gallons per day to 1 million gallons per day. The construction is being completed by Michael F. Ronca and Sons, Inc., and is scheduled for completion this winter.

A new 1-million-gallon water storage tank is slated to begin construction later this year on the Meadows II donated property from Quality Built Homes. A new production well is also being designed on the site. Not only do these new facilities enable future growth, they also improve the existing water system for the current residents. The Mayor and Council are committed to using the water and sewer impact fees collected from new users to the system to pay for these growth-related projects and not the existing users.

Hollywood Road Sidewalk Extension – The State Highway Administration has funded the completion of the Hollywood Road sidewalk extension project. The project will connect to the existing sidewalk on the westerly side of Hollywood Road at Mattingly Street to Leonard's Grant Parkway and on the east side from the light at Leonard's Grant Parkway to Town Run Drive. The project will not only allow for continuous safe pedestrian access, but will also improve storm drainage issues along portions of Hollywood Road. The project is scheduled to go out to bid July 2, 2025.

Additional Parking and Amenities Added at Leonardtown Wharf – In July 2024, an additional .39 acres of land adjacent to the Leonardtown Wharf was purchased by the Town and is being planned for additional parking. A Community Legacy grant has been applied for to help fund the construction of the parking lot. The Leonardtown Wharf has become such a popular spot for residents and visitors alike!

A number of new amenities have been added over the last year near the Wharf playground area. A new outdoor ping pong table, chess/checker table and accessories were added by the Town. Wheatley's Sealcoating donated hopscotch and other fun activities on the asphalt last summer and most recently Forever Lawn by the Bay donated a new artificial grass corn hole court and are adding permanent corn hole boards.

The floating dock and slips were completed last year and the sewer pump out station and water and electric facilities were added on the slips. This has enhanced the visitors experience when boating to Leonardtown.

#### TRASH AND RECYCLING INFORMATION

#### RESIDENTIAL WATER AND SEWER RATES -EFFECTIVE JULY 1, 2024

Town residential customers are billed for their **water and sewer use** based on their **metered water consumption.** Meters are read and customers are billed on a calendar quarter basis. The rates are as follows:

WATER Minimum Charge \$30.60 per quarter; includes 1 to 10,000

gallons of water

Extra Consumption \$2.55 for each thousand gallons, or fraction

thereof, over 10,000 gallons.

SEWER Minimum Charge \$70.47 per quarter; includes 1 to 10,000

gallons

Extra Consumption \$7.05 for each thousand gallons, or fraction

thereof, over 10,000 gallons to a maximum

sewer charge of \$162.15.

Bay Restoration Fee \$15.00 per quarter

Residential Trash/Recycling Service \$89.55 per quarter

Per Town Code, all residents are required to utilize the Town Contractor for the trash and recycling service. The minimum bill for water, sewer (up to 10,000 gallons) and trash service will be \$205.62.

We now offer On-Line Bill Pay through our website at www.leonardtown.somd. com. Find the link on the front page that is labeled "Pay Utility Bill On-Line", and follow the steps.

If you find you need additional trash container(s), please contact the Town Office at 301-475-9791. There is no extra monthly pick-up charge, but you will have to pay for the trash container.

**Bulk Trash Pickup** – Bulk trash pickup always falls on the first Thursday or Friday (depending on your regular pickup day) of March, June, September, and December. So, the next quarterly bulk trash pickup dates for the remainder of 2024 will be December 5<sup>th</sup> or 6<sup>th</sup>.

## WASTE WATER TREATMENT PLANT

Many materials potentially flushed or poured down the drain can harm the pipes that connect to our sewers, and the sewers themselves as well as harm the treatment system and cause grinder pumps to fail. Eventually, this will harm our environment.

Please don't flush down non-readily dissolvable items. If it doesn't dissolve immediately in a bowl, it has no place in the sewer. The exception, of course, is toilet paper.

Grease is a major problem for our system. It will coat the sewer walls and eventually cause a clog and backup. In addition, the treatment plant does not degrade grease very well. Pour grease into a container, let it solidify, and throw it in the trash.

Obviously, toxic materials are not allowed. Anything that contains mercury or PCPs is prohibited. Paints, pesticides, paint thinners, solvents, explosive mixtures, lubricating oil, and unused medications are not allowed. The County has provided hazardous waste collection days to enable proper disposal of these items.
